Royston from Ashover Brewery has retired, with Kim Beresford moving over to fill the void. Kim informed Charisma that a new fermenter has been installed giving the brewery an extra 50% brewing capacity

The new owner of the Bear and Monkey in Ripley has renamed it the Ripley Ale House. It was due to open August 18th but this has been delayed due to technical problems though it should be open as you read this

NorthHH o' Border Part 1

On the morning of July 7th I met up with Honest Haydn at Derby train station for the 8.13 to Newcastle, alighting at York for the more comfortable (according to HH) 9.53, which arrived in **Edinburgh** at about 12.20. Our first port of call was the NI **Kenilworth** on Rose St, a Nicholson's pub where we found Pale, Madness Absolutely, Harbour India Brown Ale, St Austell Skipper and Deuchars on hand pump. This is a cracking Grade A listed pub, one of only 4 in the city with an island bar plus an impressive gantry and a rather nice ceiling. Then it was a short walk to another NI pub, **H P Mathers Bar** on Queensferry St, where Doom Bar, Deuchars and Stewart Edinburgh Gold were on offer. A little disappointing on the ale front but another impressive gantry in this Grade B listed high-ceilinged, single-roomed boozery. Whilst in there HH organised a taxi to our next pub the NI **Bennets Bar** on Leven St, a little closer to where we needed to be, where we had a choice from Edinbrew Super Stout and Speyside Against the Grain. Yet another impressive gantry (5 bay) and a super little snug - and I mean little! - in this Grade B listed pub. From there it was a short walk to the **GBG Lock 25** on Fountainbridge, where I forgot to make a note of the beers as I was too busy sorting a taxi to get us to our next destination - I think I had another Edinbrew beer. Said taxi dropped us at the **GBG Thompson's Bar** on Morrison St where Fyne Hurricane Jack was favoured over 2 Oakham beers and Landlord.....no contest really! Finally it was on to the **GBG Haymarket**, which was really handy for the train station. Yet another Nicholson's pub with Pale, Deuchars, Doom Bar, Hop Back Summer Lightning, St Austell Skipper, Great Heck Shankar IPA, Ilkley Ruby Jane and Belhaven 80/- & Dram Good. Then it was off for the 2.41 train to Perth. Unfortunately the lights conked out as we left the station and by the time we got to Dalmeny it was deemed unrailworthy so everyone had to get off. We did get to Perth, via Kirkcaldy (and I wondered if the Duchess was still always smiling and arriving late for tea - anyone familiar with The Beatles will get that) but it meant that HH's plan to continue on to Dunkeld and visit Strathbraan Brewery had to be omitted. Undeterred a Plan B was swiftly formulated and we got the next train to **Dundee**.

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By this time my phone was just about dead and we happened upon the **GBG Bank Bar** on Union St where we had a choice from London Pride, Theakston Tour de What and Skye Gold and got some directions to our next port of call the **GBG Phoenix Ale House** on Nethergate, which had MòR Ticia, Strathbraan 80 Bob, Cross Bay Zenith, Deuchars and Landlord on offer. We fell out of there and straight in to a taxi that took us the mile or so to the **GBG NI Speedwell Bar**, known locally as "Mennies" on Perth Rd. The beer selection was a tad disappointing with Box Steam Summer Buzz being favoured over Deuchars and a collaboration brew The Great Get Together with proceeds going to the Jo Cox Foundation but the impressive bar with its four tier gantry (holding 150+ whiskies) Jacobean ceiling and panelled rooms with bell-pushes made it well worth the visit. Again it was out and straight into a taxi which took us to the NI **Frews** on Strathmartine, unfortunately the main bar area was having some work done so just the Sporting Memories Lounge was open. Inveralmond Ossian was the only ale on offer and not in particularly good order. Finally it was a taxi to the NI **Clep Bar**, this Grade B listed pub is NRA but was worth a visit. So then it was back to the train station and back to **Perth** and the **GBG Green Room** on Canal St where once we'd been directed to the real ale bar, which is on the ground floor, we had a choice from Robinson Robohop, Inveralmond Beltain, Lia Fail & Rascal, Jaw Breaker and Woodfordes Electric IPA. We had a choice from Inveralmond Lia Fail & Ossian at the **GBG Kirkside** on St John's Place but by the time we'd got to the **GBG Greyfriars** on South St my phone had died so I couldn't make a note of the beers (I think it was a couple from Inveralmond). After calling in a chip shop for some much needed sustenance it was a taxi out to our final port of call, the **GBG Cherrybank Inn**, which happened to be our digs for the evening so after we'd checked in and offloaded our bags we could well and truly chill out. Inveralmond Lia Fail & Ossian,

Harviestoun Schiehallion, Saddlers Peaky Blinders and Findos (brewery unknown) were on hand pump and a couple of leisurely pints were had (one as we sat outside watching a deer on some allotments across the road) before we called it a day - Ed

RuRAD Supporting Local Beer Festivals

On opening day of the **Victoria Beer Festival** in **Alfreton**, which is normally the first weekend in August, I called in to see what delights Nick had on offer. I found a selection of 8 beers, which included, Shoot The Servant from Pentrich, Tuck Porter from Lincoln Green, Jaipur, Unstone Oat Stout from Drone Valley, Gold from Old Sawley, American Pale Ale from Smuggler, Reaper from Hartshorne, and Crail Ale from St. Andrews. I sampled the Smugglers and the St. Andrews which were both on good form, well worth a visit - Charisma

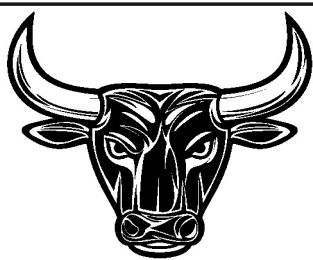

Hooked up with Arkwright for a trip up to **Carlisle** for the DRS open day for charity - not great cos raining! Afterwards it was back to town to check out the new **301 Miles from London** bar on the railway station where I tried Rebel Beer Co Surfbum 3.5%, then across to the **Griffin** and sampled Eden Brewery Best 4%. Now it's back to the car and down to **Chorley** (Chorley you can't be serious? - Ed) first port of call the **GBG Railway** and a half of Brakspear Shires 4%, then around the corner to the **GBG Malt & Hops** for a half of Doghouse UPA 4%. Then back to the car for a short drive to the **Ale Station** micro pub and a half of Rock the Boat Liverpool IPA 4.4% and a half of Gene Pool Brewery in the **GBG Shepherds Ale House** micro pub. Then another short walk to the **GBG Crown** and a half of Wishbone Volk 10 3.9% before a half of Hubsters Tribute Special Bitter 4% at the **GBG Potters Arms**. Now across the road to the **Bootleggers** micro pub for a half of Hubsters Hop Session 3.6% before moving on to another micro pub apparently but no sticks in view so tried a bottle of Irwell Works Mad Dogs & Englishmen 5.5%. Back to the car now and home for about 1am Sunday morning, best part of 400 miles, great day out - HH

Rodders & I met for a train to **Leicester**, which took only 25 minutes to get there. I had not done any pubs there before and Rodders had done some a while back so it was a bit of a mystery tour. Straight outside the station was the **Parcel Yard**,

a Steaming Billy conversion of an old railway building. We shunned 2 of their own ales and Wickwar Bob in favour of Otter Summer Light and Big Lamp Bitter, which were a good starter. Down the road to the **GBG Ale Wagon** which is a good old-fashioned pub owned by Hoskins Bros. 3 of their ales featured and I found the Hoskins Bitter excellent with Belvoir Gordon Bennett and Gun Dog Yankee Poodle completing the selection. We then tried the **Exchange**, which is a café bar in a flat iron shaped end of street building. Rodders had Nobby's Mosaic, which was newly on, and I had Ramsbury Flint Knapper, which had been on too long. Close by was the **Phoenix Café Bar** presumably owned by the theatre of the same name. They had 3 Everards ales (Tiger, Old Original & Single Hop IPA) and Langton's Caudle. I had never had the latter before but regretted it as it was not too good. Time for a decent drink again so we made our way to the **Salmon**, which was our furthest north; a nice pub but not very attractive surroundings. I had Black Country Fireside as an antidote to the previous 2 drinks and it would have been good to stay longer with 2 more Black Country, 2 from Holdens, 2 from Fixed Wheel and one each from Coastal, Mantle and Froth Blowers. A bit surprising that this is not in **GBG** currently. Then another disappointment at the **Queen of Bradgate** where with 10 ales on WhatPub we found only 2 ales (Oakham and Everards) and 2 ciders on only 6 sticks. Just across the road the Everards **Globe** offered 4 of their own and Castle Rock Elsie Mo but was not very welcoming at the bar, where we had to ask for the beer to be topped up. We passed Leicester Cathedral on the way to **Wygston's House**, which is reportedly the oldest building in the city. It has not been open in this format for long and is a café bar with a difference. With 10% CAMRA discount and a choice of Langton's Traction, Hart No 3 and Charnwood Vixen & Hello Sunshine it looks like a welcome addition to the real ale scene. Close by the **GBG Criterion** was spoiled by being surrounded by roadworks barriers but when we got in it had a Hawkshead Brewery takeover with 6 of their ales plus Abstract Jungle Casual Stout and Dark Star Revelation. OK but not particularly special compared to other pubs. Another **GBG** Everards house, the **Rutland & Derby** was next and the Lacons Falcon Ale was as good as any on the day, preferred to 2 Everards or Elsie Mo.

Again close by was another newly re-opened pub, the **Blue Boar**. This was possibly the best pub of the day with 9 ales and mine from Exit 33 was excellent. It offered a friendly service with the other ales coming from Little Valley, Kettering, Cwrw IAL, Nene Valley (2), Fallen Brewing, Arbor and a house ale from Leatherbritches. Looks a cert for **GBG** next year and it was almost rude to leave but needs must and we entered the **Black Horse**, yet another **GBG** Everards pub. Apart from their own 3 ales there was a choice of Gales HSB or Elsie Mo (again). By now we had probably already done too much so the writer apologises for any errors and omissions to follow but went to the **West End Brewery Tap** featuring 4 of theirs of which my Copper was decent, plus Hopback Citra. We also went to the nearby **GBG Western**, which is another Steaming Billy place with Upham Punter, Woodfordes Electric IPA, Sadler's Peaky Blinder in addition to SB ales. We did go to **Brood at Vin Quatre**, which is another newish place and I did at least record the ales as being from Exit 33, Longman, Pentrich, Furnace, Lenton Lane and Revolutions. Lastly in the **GBG King's Head** my picture of the beer list shows 3 from Black Country Ales plus 1 each from Thomas Guest, Dancing Duck, Bosun's, Weal, Fixed Wheel and Pershore. It certainly got a bit vague towards the end and even more so when attempting to retrieve notes and memory a week later but we were certainly impressed with some of the hostelries and look forward to a return but with not so many pubs next time!-CPD

Our first full day in Norfolk was graced by a beautiful summers day. The plan was to visit a small group of pubs in the area of **Norwich** around the Trafford Arms, and to include the Kings Arms, which had a Beer Festival. We started at the **Coachmakers Arms**...a GK lease but with a strong presence from Woodfordes. I sampled the Mardlers Mild from this brewery, not seen by me for some time, and lived up to how I remember it a good traditional Dark brew. It was then

on to the, **Trafford Arms**, which always has a fair selection of Locale on it's 10 wickets, from the likes of Lacons, Woodfordes, Adnams, Golden Triangle and Shortts. My Citropolis from Golden Triangle was very acceptable. Then a walk to the next pub the **Kings Arms**. Although there was a lot of beer at their festival, the best description of the choice was dull! Some Locale some from father afield...sadly almost every one was a regular brew for that brewery. Just had one half of a Hydes Beer Studio Pale Willametta, in good order it tasted well. The **Rose** had a chequered history under the previous tenancy, the original owners have taken back the lease and once again good interesting beer from the likes of Norfolk Brewhouse, Arbor, Hopcraft and perhaps surprisingly for East Anglia Black Iris. I sampled Redneck IPA 4.9% and was not disappointed. From the station a walk up into the side streets brought us to the **Jubilee** another multi pump Locale orientated back street local. On the Bar were S & P, Shortts and Woodfordes, including Reedlighter 4.2%...good but not exceptional. Over the Road and just over the river Wensum on the far bank was the **Red Lion**...here a Wolf: Sly Wolf was very acceptable. A further 20 min walk brought us to the **Fat Cat Tap** where there was a lot of beer, some on the bar and some in a cooled room at the back, a couple of brews of interest but we restricted ourselves to trying the Lacons Falcon Ale...new to me but up to the usual very high standards set by Will Wood formerly brewing at Fyne Ales. From the Tap we headed to the **Roseberry**, formerly Lord Roseberry, now operated by Redwell and some very good beer was on offer including new to me Long Arm from Ealingam their Birdie Flipper had a very interesting clip both in what it depicted and it's colour! Beer was good too... We had saved the best till last and headed for the **Plasters Arms** another 20 min walk back towards the centre of Town. They had hosted an Ampersand (Keg/Bottle) new brewery launch on Friday, the Brewery based nr Bungay on the Norfolk/Suffolk Border. Carl at the Rose had recommended I try the Coffee Brown, which was done and found to be very good. On Cask we sampled the JW Lees/Cloudwater Collab Red Ale, together with Yellow Triangle unfinned Mosaic...Absolutley excellent at 3.6%, and Howling Hops Chocolate Stout 5% all very worthy offerings and a fine way to finish the spin.
